Meet Issabella, aged 4

With confidence growing, Issabella has come on in leaps and bounds (quite literally) since starting at Dingley's Promise in Reading.

Developing from an unsure, immobile child who was quite poorly when joining Dingley's Promise, Issabella has flourished into a much more confident little girl who uses between 10 and 15 signs to help her communicate her needs, plays well alongside others and exudes a natural curiosity about her environment. Her enjoyment of the ride along car is evident and her own unique personality shines through for all to appreciate.

However, things haven't always been so easy for Issabella. Born with an as yet undiagnosed condition, but thought to be genetic, Issabella has a significant global delay, dysmorphic features and still has invasive genetic testing to undergo. Issabella can experience strong allergic reactions, both to food and via her sensitive skin. Careful consideration needs to be given to her diet and each activity thought through fully beforehand. Staff at Dingley's Promise have provided plenty of time, patience, trust and reassurance to Issabella. Learning more about her has helped pave the way for her development.

Issabella proved an inspiration, when one day, she took her first tentative steps without a walker, right here at Dingley's Promise. The moment touched deep for those working so closely with her and for her family. As a result her development has raced forward, not least her confidence. Initiating play with others, whilst expressing a sense of comfort, there is no better sight to behold.

We will support Issabella to move on to school next year, with opportunities to access mainstream provision. Knowing Issabella's incredible potential, we are confident that Issabella is ready to take her next bold steps in the world.

Message from the Chair

Following a number of years of significant change, the 2016/17 year has been one of consolidation of our governance and day-to-day operational activities and services, whilst also being a period of preparation for changes in legislation and funding sources. However, we have not stood still - far from it.

We have greatly extended the volume and range of our services, including:



Improving our efficiency with the total cost per hour being **reduced to £19.75**

- We have produced briefing papers to assess the potential impact of the increase of the Nursery Education Grant (NEG) from 15 hours to 30 hours for eligible children in September 2017.
- We identified the need for a training offering to assist other settings to provide more SEND provision. So far we have developed outline course structures, content and potential delivery methods and sought funding for the full development and roll out.
- In summer 2016, we introduced an Advisory Board, significantly enhancing the expertise available to assist us with both day-to-day running and strategic planning.

The operating deficit for the year of \pounds 34k was disappointing, but not entirely unexpected. Local Authority funding has reduced and we continue to invest in the development of our services.

On behalf of everyone associated with Dingley's Promise I would like to thank our patron, Lady Catherine for her commitment to our cause over the past 5 years. She will be sorely missed by us all - happy "retirement"!

The Future - spreading the word

At Dingley's Promise we are committed to reaching as many children and families as possible. Over the past year, our vision of how we can do this has shifted substantially and we are now working hard to campaign on issues that affect our families, and to spread good practice to build wider inclusive practice in the early years.

In 2016 we worked on our first campaign, raising awareness about how important it is that children with SEND get equal access to the new 30 hour offer from the government. We teamed up with national organisations to feed our research and case studies up to them, while they gave us the national information and statistics to use in our briefings and discussions with local authorities and MPs. Our briefings were used by Central Government to consider how to ensure the 30 hours is available to all eligible children with SEND. We are now actively working with national organisations on this issue, and on ensuring the early years are as inclusive as possible. In summer 2017 we presented our model of specialist early intervention building more widespread inclusion, and have had interest from a number of local authorities who would like to understand the model and possibly adopt it in more areas across the UK.

As a result of this work, we also identified the need to share our strategies and model with more early years practitioners, since 63% of nurseries we surveyed said that they could not deliver more places for children with SEND unless they had more advice and training. Nationally, there was no accredited course available that would give practitioners a general overview of working with children with SEND in an inclusive way, and we observed an over dependence on 1:1 support for children meaning that even where children with SEND were in mainstream settings they may not be experiencing real inclusion.

We have now developed our own training programme that will launch in autumn 2017 and is accredited by ncfe at Level 3. We aim to build the skills and knowledge of more practitioners in mainstream early years settings so that they can better include children with SEND, and ensure more children can experience mainstream inclusive education.

In 2017-18 we will launch and build our training offer, and continue to work with local and central government, as well as national charities to ensure every child with SEND who is eligible can access their 30 hours.

Innovation and development

Here at Dingley's Promise, we're always looking for new ways to work with children to optimise the time they spend with us. Here, we wanted to highlight two new activities that have demonstrated impact and seen tangible results in children's skill development.

Boogie Mites Music Education Programme

We give thanks to The Shanly Foundation, who kindly funded this programme, whose legacy will continue to feel its impact for years to come.

Studies have shown that when music is used as part of early intervention strategies for children, it can impact on closing the literacy attainment gap at age five. Regular music making opportunities, that develop rhythmic and melodic awareness through singing, movement and percussion, will develop the auditory processing skills of children. Movement to music helps children develop motor and co-ordination skills, vital for independence.

Six staff in our Centres have receive training in order to use the Boogie Mites sessions with the children in our care. We look forward to the next phase of the programme, starting in September 2017, where we can train parents and carers to use the strategies at home, enhancing the opportunities for music and movement in children's lives.

Attention Bucket!

We give thanks to the NHS and their Partnership Development Fund for developing our staff in Speech and Language Therapy Interventions. All staff undertook training and on-going coaching in 'The Bucket Activity' as part of Learn Through Play sessions. So far **40 children have benefited** from the activity in our Centres and as a result:

- Shorter and more frequent sessions being delivered to all children, every day. Thus, more children can benefit from the activity, more often.
- Staff have reported feeling more confident with supporting children with their speech and language development.
- Paperwork is being completed in line with guidelines laid down by the NHS.
- With many children saying the word 'bucket' at home, we receive many enquiries into this activity. We are pleased to be able to support parents with utilising the resources and using this activity at home.

Investing in our staff to learn new skills, adopt new ideas and become confident with new approaches promises long lasting rewards for children.



Learn Through Play

At our three, Oftsed Outstanding Centres, our qualified and highly experienced staff work tirelessly over the school year to provide play sessions like no other.

Following the Early Years Foundation Stage, activities include:

- Music and movement to develop co-ordination skills to help with fine and gross motor skills; pincer grip and rolling.
- Physiotherapy and massage to develop strength and muscle tone. Improving functional mobility; sitting, standing and walking.
- Communication strategies, such as Makaton and Picture Exchange Communication System (PECS) to stimulate the senses and help non-verbal children express themselves.
- Table-top activities and story-telling to support socialisation.

Our sessions provide a safe and stimulating environment; that promises to make development imaginable

Our Learn Through Play sessions are the perfect environment for further assessment and therapy by professionals working with children and their families. This can include Physiotherapists and Occupational Therapists, Speech and Language Therapists and General Practitioners.

Holiday playschemes

Here at Dingley's Promise, we don't forget about the school holidays. These breaks in the school year are perfect to kick back from the routine of education. However, we want to optimise the time that we can make a difference.

Our Playscheme days offer the chance for brothers and sisters to join in the fun and learn some of the best communication techniques for their sibling. We believe in strengthening this special bond to improve understanding between siblings.

We also recognise that our Holiday Playscheme Days are essential respite for families. Caring for a young child with additional needs and disabilities is a full-time job, demanding, both physically and emotionally.

Providers Advisory Support Service (PASS)

We want children with additional needs and disabilities to fly. We provide them with the wings and let them seek their potential in their next setting.

We work hard to ensure children in our care are working towards their next educational step. It makes us proud when a child no longer needs us and can move on to another nursery or even school.

Here at Dingley's Promise, we partner with other health and education professionals to make this step as smooth as possible. With a planned approach of visits to the next setting, meeting new faces and learning new routines. Here at Dingley's Promise, we share best practice, offer the tools and techniques that have worked well and upskill new staff to ensure continuous development.

Equipping a new nursery or school with the strategies that help a child develop, promises to make change possible.

Support for the whole family

We know the importance of caring for the carer. We work with parents to ensure they attend to their own health and well-being so they can really be there for their child. We also empower families with sharing successful strategies with their child so they can be used at home. This holistic approach sees children flourish and families better connected.

Our Family Support work provides:

- Regular parent/carer activities such as coffee mornings, parent workshops and social activities.
- Collation and sharing of information on other groups and organisations that might benefit our families.
- Support to families when attending appointments with other Professionals (e.g. Health and Education).

Families provide one of the strongest building blocks in life; we promise to support our families to unlock a child's potential.

Involving families every step of the way

Our families help guide us and keep us on track so we continue to deliver aspirational Early Years provision. Parents and Carers know their children best and we seek to join forces to achieve what can be considered by some, the unachievable.

We have parent representatives in every Centre, approachable family members, with one thing in common – to challenge us to deliver first-rate early years provision to their children. Views, opinions, thoughts and questions can all be directed to our Parent Representatives. These will either be addressed locally in the Centre or can be taken to the Parent Committee Meetings. Held quarterly with regular attendance from the Operations Manager and Chief Executive, information can flow both ways. With a Trustee responsible for Parent Support, we ensure information, views and concerns can be addressed quickly and truly shape our services.

Kathryn undertook several 'Dashed for Dingley' including Endure 24 and the Brighton Marathon raising over £470!


